The books have been adapted to help students with vision loss. In an effort to encourage my students to look within themselves and find their strength, we read Lori Weber's "Lightning Lou", with a focus on how the protagonist overcomes adversity and becomes resilient. Come discuss how to use this novel to explore rural Quebec's rich history, love of hockey, and its ability to have students connect and reflect on their own adversities.</p> |

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| <p>11:20 am – 11:50 am</p> | <p>Emotion Coaching Elizabeth Roberts & Andrew Bennett <i>Lester B. Pearson School Board</i></p> <p>Teachers are intermittently faced with the challenge of helping students who have experienced developmental trauma. These children often present with major obstacles to learning and classroom-based functioning, such as impairments in their emotional and behavioural regulation and task-focus. This presentation will review the use of emotion coaching as a strategy which is informed by attachment principles. This approach guides teachers to notice signs of increasing emotionality prior to the emergence of oppositional, defiant behaviour and provides a framework to de-escalate and coach adaptive behaviours.
